Stamp Paper Edgers

Here's an idea for those of you struggling with "unsoakable" stamps. Use a paper edger that has perforation-like edges to cut the stamp from the envelope or postcard.

The result looks pretty good, and when the next great idea comes along to get those "unsoakables" off envelopes safely, no harm has been done to the stamp.



These paper edgers cost about \$2.50 each. We have not found any at local hobby and craft stores so we are placing an online order for interested members.

President's Message



As my son and daughter grew up, I kept hoping that one of them would develop some interest in philately. That never happened. Now the question is . . . what to do with this assortment of stamps, albums, covers, etc. that no one knows much about except me. I

certainly do not want my collection to be discarded or stored improperly.

It's OK if you are unsure about the disposition of your collection. Just make certain that someone else knows the importance of storing your philatelic items correctly and placing them in a safe, secure place should something ever happen to you.

I would like to suggest that you make a New Year's resolution to do three things in the next few weeks.

- ⇒ Write down what you want done with your collection and tell family members of your decision.
- ⇒ Create a list of your collection's contents. It does not have to be elaborate. Note items that are unique, are of a higher value, or that you cherish. Equally important is noting where each item can be found in the collection.
- ⇒ Distribute copies to family members and store the original with your other important financial papers.

These simple tasks – creating a secure storage area, and documenting key items in your collection – will be most helpful to whoever is involved in handling your philatelic treasures. One nice thing about starting something like this – you can expand and update it as needed or as desired.

I would like you to consider these thoughts as part of your New Year's resolutions. You will be happy that you did. Best wishes to all for the New Year . . . Ed.

Among the speakers was Warren Scheible who showed a U.S. \$2 bill postmarked on its first day of circulation, April 13, 1976 (also Thomas Jefferson's 233rd birthday). The bill has a picture of Jefferson and John Adams signing the Declaration of Independence.




Jeff Boyarsky displayed some covers related to breakfast foods he is accumulating. Tony Zingale showed a Fiskar Stamp Paper Edger that can be used to create a simulated perforation around those annoying U.S. (and foreign) stamps that are difficult to soak off paper.

Don Bunker's Machin stamps with unusual "dots" opened some discussion as to their use. Joe Seliga thought they related to sorting mail. Sounds good since *Linn's Stamp News* in their April 24, 2006 issue (page 42, Collectors' Forum), notes the following: "The spots are British mail-test markings that are applied to the faces of envelopes in tracking mail pieces during a mail test. Some of them happened to fall on the stamps affixed to the face of the envelope."

Ed Muench's presentation on Bicycle Stamps and Covers capped off the evening. Ed showed a number of bicycle-related philatelic items that he has accumulated over the years. Included in his collection

Society Auction

Its auction time again! This is a good opportunity to dispose of some of that extra material we all have. A limit of ten (10) auction items per member is in effect but exceptions abound.



Considerations and ideas include:

- Put up items that fellow members collect (see list on web site).
- Reference publications and specialized auction catalogs are always popular.
- Postcards, covers, even coins do well in the sale.
- Common mint U.S. usually sells for face value.
- The condition of the item is key; choice and unique items are in demand.

The **Auction List Sheet** (included with this Newsletter) lists items for sale. Complete as follows:

- Put Seller's Name and Date at the top.
- List Item Name, Country or Scott # and a Description of the item including condition, faults and catalog / retail values.
- Enter the minimum bid in 25¢ increments. Be realistic – common items usually go for a small fraction of catalog value.

If necessary, use 2-3 lines to describe the auction lot and then renumber the line item on the Auction List Sheet.

Auction Items MUST contain a description that at least matches the Auction List Sheet. The more detail the better. You can use a label or post-it note for large items.

Auction items are SOLD AS IS so examine the lots before bidding. Plan your bids based on what you see, not what is written on the auction item. Use tongs and magnifiers check for faults. Philatelic accessories and some stamp catalogs will be available for your use. Talk to the seller for details on larger or mixed lots.

Bidding: Obtain a bidder number before the auction starts. Bidding opens with the seller's minimum bid. Increments are 25-50¢ depending on the item. The Auctioneer may change increments based on competitive bidding. No bids after the Auctioneer calls the lot.

Payments are made by winning bidders after all auction items are sold. Sellers are then paid the sales price realized MINUS a 10% commission for HTPS. Amounts are rounded to 5¢ increments.

Donations of lots for HTPS are always welcome. Please indicate on the Auction List Sheet or tell the Auctioneer.
