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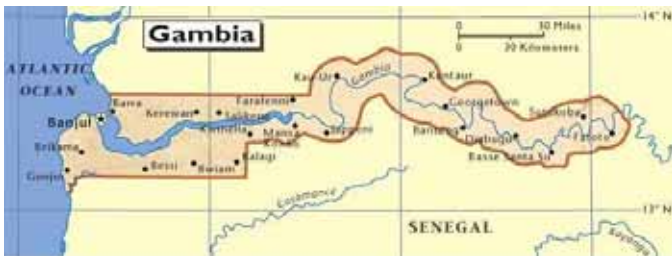

Those stamps are usually found in the back of your stamp album, beginning with the semi-postals (prefix 'B') to Christmas Seals ('WS') as assigned by Scott Publications.



We thank Tom for his talk. Hopefully this will encourage the U.S. collectors in the audience to think about collecting the wide variety of BOB issues.

Distinguished Sailors

On February 4, 2010, my wife and I had the opportunity to attend the first day ceremony for the 44¢ "Distinguished Sailors" stamps held at the Arleigh and Roberta Burke Theatre of the U.S. Navy Memorial in Washington, DC. The honored sailors included:

- ⇒ Admiral William S. Sims (1858-1936)
- ⇒ Admiral Arleigh A. Burke (1901-1996)
- ⇒ Petty Officer 3rd Class Doris Miller (1919-1943)
- ⇒ Lt. Commander John McCoy (1876-1945)



The ceremony started at 10:30 AM and several dignitaries were present including Rear Admiral Edward K. Walker, Jr. Ret., President of the United States Navy Memorial, Honorable John E. Potter Postmaster General and CEO of the United States Postal System, Honorable

Juan M. Garcia, Assistant Secretary to the Navy, Vice Admiral Samuel J. Locklar, Director of Navy Staff and David A. Rosenberg, PhD, Naval Historian.

All four of the distinguished sailors had amazing Navy careers. After the ceremony I obtained the ceremony program, multiple first day cancellations and the signatures of many of the speakers.

After lunch at Union Station, I went to the Smithsonian Postal Museum and Philatelic Library. I met again with James O'Donnell who is a museum specialist. HTPS members had met with him during an earlier trip to the museum. I also met with Jack Feldman – a local stamp collector and friend of mine.

I had the opportunity to inspect the Floyd Leach and Eugene Michel reference collections of postal stationery. I was particularly interested in the Spanish and American postal stationery of Puerto Rico since they have multiple collections available for research in my field of interest.

With the help of Paul K. McCutcheon, branch librarian, I was also able to continue my search of articles related to Puerto Rico philately. Mr. Thomas Lera, Chair of Research, gave me a demonstration of their computerized camera for enlarging and studying postage stamps and covers.

Later on I was pleased to donate a copy of my book, "First Day Cover Catalogue of US Stamps Related to Puerto Rico" to Paul McCutcheon for use by the National Postal Museum library.



At the end of the day I had the opportunity to visit some of my family prior to my return to the hotel. Unfortunately I had to cut my visit short because of the impending snow storm forecast for that same day. On Friday evening, Washington was buried under 24-30 inches of snow, but by then I was already back in New Jersey. I look forward to another visit to the Smithsonian Postal Museum and Library.

ARIPEX '10 Stamp Show

In my new assignment as a roving reporter for *The Hamilton Hinge*, I attended the 2010 ARIPEX stamp show. This event, now in its 52nd consecutive year, alternates between Tucson and Mesa, Arizona and is one of the APS World Series of Philately events.



I arrived at the Mesa Convention Center just in time for the 10 AM opening ceremony. There were over

forty stamp dealers at the show, many of whom I had never seen before.

My first stop was at A&D Stamps of Walnut Creek, California. Jim and Sue Dempsey carry one of the largest stocks of world-wide stamps. Unfortunately for us, they rarely come to the East Coast. I estimated that they have over 500 red boxes, not to mention the dealer books with the larger and more expensive items.



I next went to A-to-Z stamps, run by Michael and Cecilia Ball of Mesa, Arizona. Michael helps run the show and is the show contact for the dealer bourse. While A-to-Z might not have as many stamps as A&D, they allow the buyers to pick out the boxes themselves saving a lot of time, and they have very good prices.

My next stop was to look at the exhibits. There were over 250 frames setup – ranging from youth exhibits, created by local area schools, to APS World Series of Philately winners.



One of the most viewed exhibits was that from Don Price on "The Jenny" – the first US Airmail stamp issued in 1918. This exhibit included the rare inverted Airplane (Scott #C3a). Most interesting to me, however, were other examples of "Jenny" printing variations.

He showed numerous examples of the airplane flying right-side up, but offset in various positions from the center of the stamp

After a brief lunch at the concession stand, I then returned to the "trading floor" to visit the other dealers at the show. My goal was to stop by each booth, and peruse their wares.

One dealer, Michael Jaffe, had a large selection of U.S. space fillers, mostly



back of the book items, at 10% of catalog. I was able to fill in a number of spaces in my album including several "Offices in China". Martin Shupe from California had a large selection of recent US stamps in used condition, some of which are very hard to acquire.

The Friday crowd was not as large as some dealers had hoped, but they expected larger crowds on Saturday and Sunday. I was able to find seats at almost every table, and had a chance to talk to many dealers and some of the other visitors. I was given many suggestions of what to do in Phoenix and Tucson on my next visit.

There were several door prizes awarded during the show (although I did not win one). They also announced that the person traveling the farthest for the show was from Anchorage, Alaska (2,500 miles). I traveled from my home in Paris, but they used HTPS' location in Hamilton, NJ (2,100 miles) as my starting point.

Unfortunately, I was only part of the way around the hall



when the announcement came at 6 PM that the bourse was closing. I completed my last transaction and proceeded across the street to the local pub to review my purchases.

The show was a welcome change – not only from the weather on the East Coast – but also for the number of dealers one rarely, if ever, gets to see back home. I'm already planning my trip to the next ARIPEX show, scheduled from January 14-16, 2011 at the Tucson Convention Center.

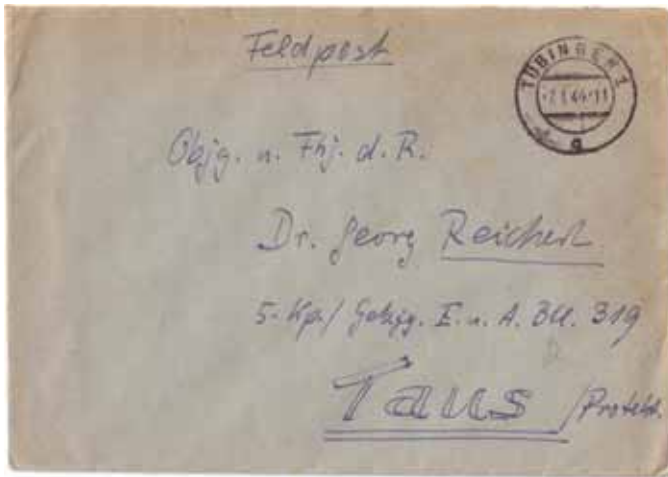

It Started at MERPEX

Early one Saturday morning at last year's MERPEX show, a table drew my attention with its plastic boxes filled with covers. I seem to be drawn to covers since spending my time at the Cover Man's boxes at the NYC ASDA Mega Events the last couple of years.

The 50¢ box had lots of foreign covers. One that caught my eye had *Feldpost* written at the top with a bridge-type postmark of "2.1.44·11" (January 2, 1944 at 11 AM). It was addressed to a soldier named Dr. Georg Reichert and was stampless. I thought that was odd, since the Post Office in most countries requires you to put a stamp on the envelope, when you are sending a letter to a serviceman.



The address was mostly mnemonics which I didn't recognize. The word "gebirg" piqued my interest. This man was in a WW2 German Army mountain division, and they are special in any army. I was hooked and bought the cover. There was no letter, so I had to be content with deciphering the address and then try to figure out who the soldier was and what he did.

As you can see from the cover scan, in front of his name was *Objg. u. Fhj. d. R.* I assumed that this is the man's rank, but I don't know the meaning of the abbreviations. Following his name was an even more mystifying, *5.Kp./ Geb.jg. E. u. A. BU. 319*. All I got from this was that he was in the 5th company of a mountain division, most probably the 319th regiment since the Germans didn't have that many mountain divisions. The last line read in big letters, *Taus/Protekt*. That is not the name of any country known to me.

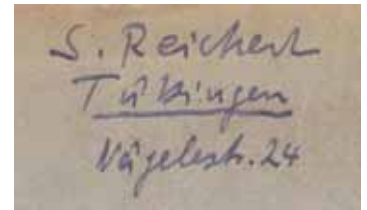
I brought the envelope to an HTPS meeting for "show and tell" or in my case "show and ask." Some members suggested that the Internet might provide answers. Good advice. First, I tried the Third Reich Study Group which is part of the German Philatelic Society. I contacted the

group chairman who confirmed that Dr. Reichert was an officer candidate in the mountain division.

Then I looked for a site containing information on the German Army during WW2. I found a site called "feldgrau" with a forum, where members could post questions. I made an application and after a few days, became a member. My posted questions received a response from Mr. Simon Harrold in the United Kingdom. Most of the mystery was solved.

Dr. Georg Reichert was an *Oberjäger* (NCO) und *Fahnenjunker* (Ensign) *der Regiment*. He was a member of the 5th *Kompanie* (company) of *Gebirgsjäger-Ersatz- und Ausbildungs-Bataillon 319* stationed in Taus, in the Protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia. The purpose of an *Ersatz- und Ausbildungs-Bataillon* is to provide training and instruction of new recruits for replacements for its allotted "home" Division. In 1944, the 319th Battalion was under command of the 418th Division.

There are still questions about this cover. The return address, as shown on the cropped back cover image, reads "S. Reichert, Tubingen, Najelesh.24" – most likely a family member. Yet no stamp was used.



The envelope does not have a field post number. I discovered that Feldpost numbers were briefly issued in October 1944 for a Reserve-Grenadier-Bataillon 319, but they were quickly withdrawn in November 1944. So how did the army postal service route letters to the men of this regiment?

I did not find the 418th Division in a list of German WW2 divisions. Why would a mountain battalion be the replacement source for the 418th Division? And why was this battalion stationed in Bohemia and Moravia from 1942 to 1944? I found that Goranska was in the part of Slovenia that was given to Germany after their invasion of Yugoslavia along with Stajerska and Koroska. I did find that during WW2, the Germans dug some catacombs under a town in Gorenska. I wonder why?

So I have a work in progress. I'm still searching for more information on Dr. Reichert. I will try the Reichert family genealogical site and the German military site on the internet.

I have been a researcher of military information in libraries and archives for quite some time. This cover provided a satisfying search over many weeks and will do so for many more. I hope that your cover discoveries provide you with as much enjoyment as mine have.

Westfield Stamp Club

On January 28, Ed Murtha, Bob Stolarz and I attended the monthly meeting of the Westfield Stamp Club. It was an enjoyable experience, and we knew some Westfield members from our work at the NOJEX show. In fact, some members have made presentations at our meetings.

It took a little over an hour driving from Hamilton. We stopped for dinner at the Westfield Diner which is located just a few blocks from the meeting site.

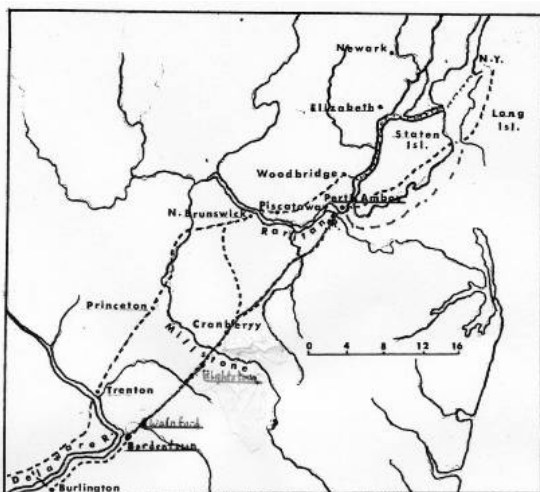
The meeting format is informal and the business portion was over quickly. There was some discussion on their annual show which is scheduled for March 6th. An auction of 20 items followed. The lots were described on a preprinted sheet. You submit items a month or so in advance so they can be reviewed and added to the sheet.

Bob Stolarz's bid of \$1.00 won a small 'sheet' of three stamps with an Olympics theme. The item was later identified as



Switzerland #1086a. Ed Murtha won some booklets from Sweden. You pay immediately after your winning bid. All auction proceeds go to the club.

The presentation that night was a Power Point show titled "The Bordentown Stage" by Robert Rose, President of the New Jersey Postal History Society. Bob spoke about a stage route which operated from Philadelphia to New York City during the Colonial period (approx. 1740 - 1792 with a break for the Revolutionary War).

As Bob related, "Cargo and passengers were transported by "stage boat" from Philadelphia and transported up the Delaware River to Bordentown and then by "stage waggon" to Perth Amboy before being ferried to lower Manhattan. The full trip took three days. The stage route passed through Walnford, Hightstown and Cranberry along a path that is Route 130 today.

Bob displayed a small selection of folded letters with a "Bordentown Stage" manuscript notation.

Also shown were the six known covers with the "Bordentown & New York Stage" handstamp. There are no postal markings on the covers, and there is some question as to whether this route was contracted by the U.S. Postal System or was handled by a private carrier.



The cover shown above is addressed to "Capt. William Smith" in "Hydestown" (known today as Hightstown).
