## April's Proceedings

Another large crowd turned out for our April meeting. President **Ed Murtha** led the group through the business portion of the meeting. The main item on the agenda was the nomination of officers – our current officers were all nominated for another term. The election will be held at our May meeting.

Other business items included the need for volunteers to help set-up and take-down the exhibits at the NOJEX show in May. Please contact **Ed Murtha** if you are interested in helping out. Ed also asked for volunteers for the “Mini-Presentations” next month. While a full slate of presenters have been selected for May, contact **Bob Stolarz** if you are interested in presenting at a future meeting.

**Sherm Britton** reported that 10 pounds of stamps were recently shipped to the Vets. He thanked all the members who contributed to this good cause. We also welcomed another new member – **Bill Andersen** – who collects the U.S. 3-cent issues from the 1851-57 series.



The main feature was a dynamic Power Point presentation by HTPS member **Hank Applegate** on the Philadelphia Sesquicentennial exhibition of 1926. The event, which ran from May through November 1926, celebrated the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of American Independence. The fair was located in South Philadelphia in the area of the current Navy Yard and the Sports Complex.



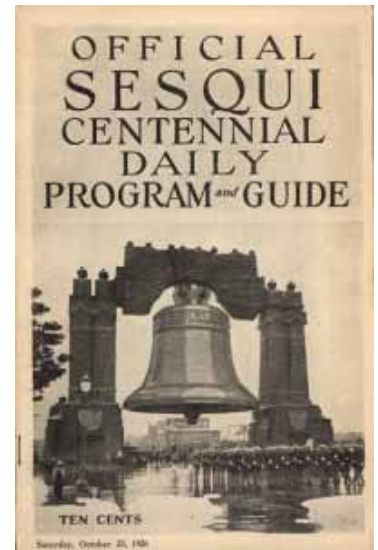
The symbol of the fair was a massive 80 foot replica of the Liberty Bell with 26,000 lights. The bell also appears on the U.S. stamp (Scott # 627).

There were five main exhibition halls, as well as a number of smaller structures built by foreign nations and states. In addition, there was a re-creation of a street in colonial Philadelphia and an amusement park for the kids.

Hank's presentation led us through the fair grounds using post cards and other

memorabilia to highlight various sites. Also included were covers and several cancellations and postal markings from the Model Post Office located at the exhibition.

Hank also displayed covers flown on the several contract airmail services (CAMS) that operated from Philadelphia to New York and Washington during that period. Rubber and steel cancellation devices used at the Model Post Office were included. Shown below is a cover from the special week long extension of CAM 13 during the National Air Races.



Even though the fair did not draw large crowds and ended in bankruptcy, several structures, including the Ben Franklin Bridge and the original Municipal Stadium in South Philadelphia, remained as a legacy.

We thank Hank for providing us with an interesting day at the Fair.

Effective, April 17, 2011, selected USPS postage rates took effect including:

- Postcards ..... \$.29
- 1st class, 1 oz (unchanged)..... \$.44
- 1st class, 1 oz (odd size) ..... \$.64
- 1st class, 2 oz ..... \$.64
- 1st class, 2 oz (odd size) ..... \$.84
- 1st class, 3 oz ..... \$.84
- 1st class, 3.5 oz ..... \$1.04
- 1st class, 4 oz ..... \$1.48
- Canada or Mexico, 1 oz ..... \$.80
- Other international, 1 oz..... \$.98



A new 64-cent stamp was issued in April of this year (pictured at the left). The stamp can be used for 2 oz mailings and is especially suited for wedding invitations.

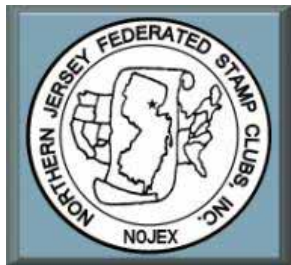

## NOJEX 2011

The 48th annual exhibition of the **North New Jersey Federated Stamp Clubs** is scheduled for **May 27-29** at the Meadowlands Crowne Plaza Hotel in Secaucus, NJ just off Exit 16W on the New Jersey Turnpike.

## Statue of Liberty Stamp

Issued in December of last year, the latest Statue of Liberty stamp looked like another fine addition to the large number of such issues worldwide (23 in the U.S. alone). The non-denominated (44¢) first class forever stamp was issued in coil strips of 100 alternating with a U.S. flag issue.

USPS officials were surprised when a collector notified them that the image was not taken from the statue designed by sculptor Frederic-Auguste Bartholdi and located on Liberty Island in NYC's harbor. In fact, it was based on a photo of a half sized replica located outside of the New York–New York Hotel & Casino in Las Vegas, NV (image at right from the hotel's website).



Quoted in an April 15 Reuters article, Roy Betts, a USPS spokesman said "We certainly regret having made the error." Betts partly blamed Getty Images, the stock photography company that supplied the image, for ambiguously labeling the image in its database. While the image is simply titled "Statue of Liberty," the keywords attached to it include "Nevada" and "Replica Statue of Liberty - Las Vegas," although Betts say this information was added only after the USPS raised the point with Getty.

The USPS became aware of what it is calling a "mischaracterization" about a month ago, Betts said. News of the mix-up was first reported in the latest issue of Linns Stamp News, a magazine for stamp enthusiasts.

Betts also reported that 3 billion stamps have been printed and they will not be pulled from the market. An ATM pane of 18 is scheduled for an April release and double-sided booklets of 20 are planned to be issued in September of this year.

## A VISIT TO THE AMERICAN PHILATELIC SOCIETY HEADQUARTERS IN BELLEFONTE, PA by Joseph Francis Seliga

Our trip to the American Philatelic Society (APS) Offices in Bellefonte, PA included **Dr. Ron Gonzalez**, **Ed Murtha** and the author. Ed picked me up at my house at the crack of dawn, i.e. 7 am. We stopped for breakfast at a restaurant just outside Harrisburg; being about halfway, it was a good place to stop, walk around and get something to eat. Of course, with such amiable companions, the trip went quickly, and we arrived at APS Headquarters just before noon.

The APS sign isn't visible from the road because the HQ building is at the back of the complex. **Ron**, having been there before, guided us to our destination. We signed in and were told that our tour guide, **Gretchen**, would be



available at 3 pm. We headed to the library to look at periodicals and books. Ron and I had our lists on hand. It is recommended that you prepare for your visit by creating a list of publications

by searching the online American Philatelic Research Library (APRL) catalog.

The librarian quickly found the books that I had on my list. While waiting, I looked around and found that there were several other areas that would be of interest to any philatelist. The first was a table with five boxes of postcards and covers, at 10¢ each. I bought several dollars' worth. Next were four book racks, two of which were chock full of catalogs, books and pamphlets that

sold for \$1 each. I bought one book, *The New Philatelic Exhibitors Handbook* by Randy L. Neil, and two catalogs, one for US Postcards to 1980 and a Stanley Gibbons for Balkan stamps, 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, issued in 1982. The other two bookcases had higher priced volumes for half price.

I realized that it wasn't possible to read all of the books, catalogs and periodicals that were on my list while I was there. The librarian told me that I could borrow them



and return them by media rate mail. There was no initial charge, as there would be if you asked to ship them by mail. The library also has a self serve photocopy machine for 20¢ per copy. The main library has open stacks, so you can browse and find other items that you might have missed in your catalog search. Books are separately shelved from society newsletters.

Three o'clock came quickly.

Gretchen arrived and gave us a complete tour through all of the buildings in the complex. The Match Factory was not built all at once. There was an original building and many add-ons through the years. We saw them all:

- American Philatelic Research Library
- Editorial Office for the American Philatelist
- Expertizing Room, where they receive 60 requests per week and service them for a modest fee
- Sundman-Mystic Exhibition Hall
- On-Line Sales Division
- Circuit Books Sales Division
- Shipping Department

- Education Department Offices;
- George & Carole Kramer Philatelic Gallery;
- American Philatelic Research Library Annex;
- Lounge and seminar rooms;
- Special Meeting Room funded by the American Airmail Society and
- Post Office, on loan from the Smithsonian Museum, with **Ron, Joe and Ed** about to enter.

The tour included the people working in each section, all of whom were gracious and friendly.

Gretchen told us about OTTO's Pub, a micro-brewery in State College that happily was on the same street as our motel. Good food, with good companions at dinner got us in the right mood to prepare for Thursday.

On Thursday Ed took us to APS HQ via the scenic route, which interestingly enough also included his favorite fishing spots, one of which is named Fisherman's Paradise. We now understand why he fishes in this area. It is absolutely gorgeous.

Thursday was the day for our examination of the Sales Division circuit book sections. Before going there, I got the items that I wanted to take with me and brought them to the librarian to be listed and packed.



Off we went to look at the circuit books. So here we are, happy as bugs in a rug, each checking the circuit book of his interest. Bring your magnifier, tongs, per gauge, list of what you need and some glassines or stock sheets for your purchases.

We looked at current books and also remainder / retired ones which you must buy for a set price. This is a great way to retire a circuit book, especially for widows or widowers or for those who don't want to remount the remains in a new book. Was I surprised when I found that the first book I examined was one that had many of my APS identifier stamps in it from 1985? If I only had waited these twenty years or so, I could have bought them for a fraction of what I originally paid.



We left the APS HQ just after noon and wound our way to Boalsburg, the home of the 28<sup>th</sup> Division Museum, a Pennsylvania National Guard unit that was mobilized many times by the Federal government. The unit chased Pancho Villa in Mexico



and served on the front lines in WW I and WW II. Ed found some information about an uncle of his who was in that division during WW I.

We left the museum about two pm and stopped at Duffy's Tavern in Boalsburg where we had an excellent lunch in a tavern built in 1816. Notice that **Ed and Ron** are anticipating a great lunch – and it was!



After lunch, we started for home arriving there about 7:30 pm. I advise all collectors to visit the APS. You will thoroughly enjoy yourself.
