\$1.00 in mint U.S. stamps from the HTPS box to the first correct responder.



February Proceedings . . . by Jack Sack

Another full house attended the February meeting. After the flag salute and officer's reports, **President Murtha** asked us to wish well to our members who are "under the weather" and to hope for a speedy recovery so they can rejoin us in the society activities.

Ed also thanked all the members who provided stamps for **Sherm Britten** to send to various organizations including the Long Beach Stamp Club.

Among the other business items discussed were the trip to Lakehurst Naval Station and help with the setup of the NOJEX show – both scheduled for May. Please contact Ed if you are interested in either event. Other business included the design and printing of HTPS golf shirts. Please see the next page for details.

Ed also noted that there were several stamp shows coming up, including the Westfield Stamp Club show on March 3rd. The theme of this year's show is the 75th Anniversary of the Hindenburg crash. There will be talks by **Dr. Cheryl Ganz** on the Hindenburg and by former APS President **Janet Klug** on the United States Postal Service's Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee.

Ed ended the business meeting by asking members to help out with club activities. All members are welcome to attend the officers meeting, scheduled for 5 PM on April 3rd at the Capital Health building near the library.

Our speaker for the evening was **Ed Grabowski** who is the vice-president of both the Westfield Stamp Club and Collectors Club of New York. Dr. Grabowski spoke about the French



Colonial "Navigation and Commerce" stamps issued from 1892 to 1932. The stamps consist of a common design with the name of the colony printed at the bottom of the stamp. There are 29 different colonial names, and up to 14 different denominations for each colony.

Each year, Ed prepares a postal history exhibit for one of the colonies. He hopes to eventually complete the exhibit for each of the colonial groups and exhibit it all at once in one place. His latest exhibit is on the stamps from French Senegal, located in West Africa between Mauritania, the Sudan, and Guinea.

Dr. Grabowski showed many of the overprints, postmarks and other markings used on covers from the area. There were numerous postal rates depending on the weight and destination, along with special rates for Military personnel, registration, and return receipts. There was also special franking to indicate payment of postage during times of shortages of postage stamps.



One of his covers ("From Nowhere to Nowhere" shown above) is from Ziguinchor, Senegal to Szabadka, Hungary. The interesting fact is that the cover is addressed to then 7-year old Elmer Milko, who later became one of Raoul Wallenberg's closest collaborators, and helped save thousands of Hungarian Jews.

Another interesting item was a 1902 postcard delivered by camel caravan to Algiers (aka Algiers) from Timbuktu (aka Timbuctoo). The cover took seven



months to reach its destination (so no complaining about the USPS). Note the marking "Voie Sahara par Caravan" at the bottom of the cover.



Dr. Grabowski ended his talk by giving a teaser for his next exhibit on the Indian Ocean Colonies. He showed a "Declared Value" cover from

Reunion, a small island in the Indian Ocean, franked with three postage due stamps.

We will have to wait until his new exhibit is ready to hear the whole story of this cover.

At the February member, we welcomed three visitors from the Monroe Township Stamp Club:


- **Al Schickler** collects WW pre-1955.

in care of the HTPS.


Due to the incredible demand for these shirts, we must set a maximum limit of 10 shirts to each member in good standing.

GB Historic Postmarks . . . by Tony Zingale

A recent issue of *Mekeel's & Stamps* featured an article on a sheet of stamps issued in GB last September. The sheet commemorated the 350th anniversary of the postmark and included over 20 examples of postmarks used in GB during that period.

The first postmark on the sheet is the **Bishop's Mark** (top row at the left on the image below --- dated December 9). That postmark is named after Henry Bishop who was Postmaster General in 1661.



The sheet contains many other familiar postmarks. Continuing with the top row, we have the **Maltese Cross** which was used as a cancel on GB's first postage stamp issues including the Penny Black (circa 1840). Many early postmarks were also used as cancels.

Next in line is a **square circle postmark** which is found on many GB and commonwealth issues from the 1800's in the early 1900's. The last postmark on the top row is a 1964 First Day handstamp.

Over 20 postmarks are included on the sheet including some Penny Post examples used in London and Essex during the 17th century. Also shown are numerical postmarks (which often indicated the city or origin), slogans and special event cancels.

The sheet also includes twenty 1st class "seal" stamps and some narratives on the history of postmarks and their use. For anyone interested in postmark or cancel topics, this should be an item of interest.
