

NY2016 SHOW



The World Stamp Show – NY2016 is only weeks away. It is scheduled for **May 28 – June 4** at the **Javits Center in NYC**. This F.I.P sponsored event only occurs once in a decade so make your plans now to attend.

Visit the show's website for details at www.ny2016.org. A 'Quick Facts Sheet' highlighting location, hours, First Day ceremonies and other information is found at www.ny2016.org/images/factsheet-english.pdf.

Advance show registration is offered online so sign up, print out your badge and avoid the long lines (you can pick up the badge holder at the show).

This event offers something for all philatelists with more than 150 dealers selling and buying material, and postal administrations selling the latest issues.

Walk among the 4,100 frames of competitive exhibits, visit the 125+ philatelic organizations, check out the Court of Honor display of unique stamp rarities, bid at one of the six auctions, attend a seminar or one of the first day ceremonies sponsored by the USPS, U.N. Postal Administration and other nations.



HTPS will be well represented at the show. **Sid Morginstin** is at booth #767. Sid specializes in the Turkish (Ottoman) Palestine Period, British Palestine Mandate, 1948 Interim Period, Israel, Palestinian Authority and Judaica. Sid also sells Lundy island items and France / Colonies stamps.

Milt Keiles can be found at the Postal Label Study Group (PLSG) booth #675 most days during the show. Stop by and say hello and learn about this unusual philatelic niche. [Note: Milt looks much younger in B&W photos.]



Dennis Kennedy is working as a bin room checker helping with the setup of the show. **Jack Sack** is a greeter on week day mornings. **Gary Loew** gives a June 1st talk on *Silver Jubilees of the Caribbean* and is at the Postal History booth #677 for a few hours. **Jeff Boyarsky** is working as an exhibit volunteer.

CONFEDERATE STATES POSTAL HISTORY

[Editor's Note: This article is a brief summary of the presentation that Patricia gave at our April 19th meeting. All of the information and images are taken from that talk.]

Specialized collectors agree that **Confederate Postal History** begins with the secession of South Carolina from the Union on December 20, 1860.

This **First Day of the Confederacy** cover is postmarked – 'Montgomery Ala.' – where the Confederate Government was officially formed on February 4, 1861, by the first states to secede from the Union.



The **Confederate Post Office Department** was established on February 21, 1861 and Confederate Postmaster General John Henninger Reagan was appointed March 6th.

The cover below is postmarked June 1, the **First Day of the Confederate States Postal System**, with both the U.S. postage rate of 3¢ and the postal marking for the new Confederate rate of 5¢.



Confederate postage stamps were not available until mid-October, 1861. So some postmasters simply hand-marked the mail with postal rates due.

Others prepared their own postage stamps (**Provisionals**), like this 'MEMPHIS TENN' example, which were theoretically valid only in the towns in which they were produced, although they are occasionally found used as postage for other towns.



Confederate **postage rates** included:

- **3¢** --- in 1861, the U.S. postage rate was 3¢ per half-ounce. CSA rate until June 1, 1861.
- **5¢** --- the Confederacy instituted a higher rate per half-ounce on letters traveling a distance under 500 miles. This 5¢ rate was doubled for distances over 500 miles.
- **2¢** --- local drop rate, circulars, and periodicals
- **10¢** --- on July 1, 1862, the postage rate was raised to a universal rate of 10¢ for all distances.

Three **printing processes** were used in stamp production by the Confederacy: lithography, typography, and intaglio (engraving).

The first Confederate stamp featured a portrait of **President Jefferson Davis** and used stone dies. The example at the right is **#CSA #1-1, Stone 1** (from CSA Catalog). The use of stone dies and lack of quality paper accounts for the poor impressions of many CSA issues.




CSA #6 (at right) was designed and engraved on steel master dies by Jean Ferdinand Joubert De La Ferté and **printed by Thomas De La Rue & Co.** in London, England. Ships ran the blockade and the stamps were delivered to Richmond, VA. The difference in quality from the first Confederate States issue is obvious.



The Civil War period was one of high emotion, which was clearly displayed on the colorful covers known as **Patriotics**. The South was consistently short of supplies, so Confederate Patriotic covers are scarcer and are highly valued by collectors.

The cover below, addressed to Liverpool, England, is one of only two known trans-Atlantic Confederate Patriotics.

Patriotic Stickers were very popular throughout the Confederacy. The cover below includes a Star Flag Sticker with "Our Flag" Slogan. The CSA #1 stamp is postmarked Corinth, Miss. As shown by the advertising cover, "SC" on the label stood for **Southern Congress**, not South Carolina. [Ex Art Groten, Richard Warren.]



Adversity covers are one of the most popular categories of collecting and it is not hard to see why. Some collectors focus on collecting covers fashioned from colorful maps or marine charts. The example below, franked with two CSA #6 stamps, is fashioned from an advertising broadside. Gum from peach trees was used to hold the envelope together.



Adversity-Turned covers resulted from the blockade of ports cutting off sources of paper from the industrialized North and Europe. Envelopes were used two or more times by turning them inside out.



Confederate advertising covers come in a wide range of designs and topics. The most often seen designs, like the one below, are identified in the CSA Catalog.



College covers come from most every state and range from simple to elaborate designs. Below are a Univ. of Georgia cover and three college logos from other covers.



Prisoner of War Covers are a favorite of all postal history collectors. The cover below from was mailed from Fort Delaware Prison to Fluvanna County, VA and illegally bears the postage of both sides.

The regulations called for two envelopes respectively franked with the each country's appropriate postage stamps. The outer envelope was supposed to be discarded at the exchange point. Sometimes this was overlooked, to the delight of collectors.

SOCIETY AUCTION AT JUNE MEETING

Check out the HTPS website for complete details on the auction process. Meanwhile, here are a few tips to help you achieve success:



1. Fill out the Auction List Sheet with lot descriptions and the starting bids. Create a Lot Description form for each item to match the Auction List description and starting bid.
2. If you wish to donate sales proceeds to the HTPS or other organizations, indicate so on the Auction List.
3. Be reasonable with the items offered for sale. Common items usually sell for 10-15% of CV. Specialized or unique items can sell for more.
4. Items are SOLD AS IS – so carefully check the auction lots for content and quality before the auction starts.
5. Winning bidders pay for their items first. Then the sellers are paid MINUS a 10% commission for HTPS.
