## PRESIDENT’S MESSAGE

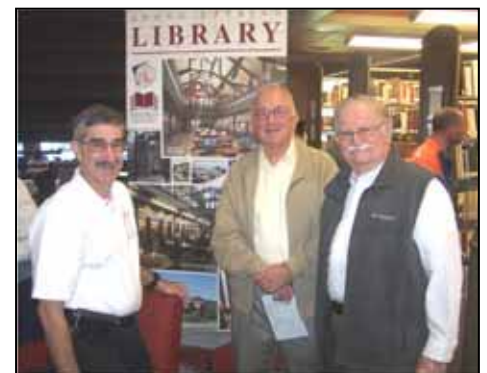

"Bicycling Stamps and Covers" by **Ed Muench** (at left) – and "Anderson Prexies FDCs" by **Andrew Boyajian**.

Everyone agreed that even without a formal meeting, it is nice to gather during the summer to chat and renew old friendships.

## SEPTEMBER MEETING PROCEEDINGS

As usual, reading of the minutes was bypassed. Treasurer **Dr. Ronald Gonzalez** presented the Treasurer's report and the 2016-2017 budget which were both unanimously approved.

Attending the meeting was **Bob Girmscheid**, a visitor from Maine, who winters with his daughter in Trenton.

President **Milton Keiles** (below at right) and VP **Dennis Kennedy** (at left) presented past President **Jeff Boyarsky** with the APS Booster certificate for his contributions as President of the Hamilton Township Philatelic Society.



**Jeff Boyarsky** announced that he is the new HTPS Membership Chairman taking over from **Dr. Jack Sack**.

**Milton Keiles** stated his concern about the drop in membership. There was some discussion on how to attract new members. An expanded mailing to local APS members was approved. Talk about using free local newspapers to advertise our meeting was thought to be a good idea, but no one volunteered to handle it.

**Bob Girmscheid** advised us that his stamp club in Maine offered an Adult Education class on evaluating (not appraising which requires a license) stamp collections. **Dr. Jess Rosenberg** offered to look into this idea.

After a brief discussion, the free membership to any HTPS member who brings in a new member or joins the APS was eliminated.

**Don Getzin** donated a 2013 Scott US Specialized Catalogue to the Society for auction. **Ron Dobrowolski** won it for \$15.

Members were asked to verify their collecting interests and email addresses on a list that was circulated during the meeting.

**Mac Sarreal**, President of the Merchantville Stamp Club (MSC) and a member of the International Philippine Philatelic Society (IPPS), spoke on the "Japanese Occupation of the Philippines" (see page 3).



## OCTOBER MEETING PROCEEDINGS

**Milton Keiles** noted that he had mailed 61 personalized and individually addressed letters to APS members who live in the local area. Disappointingly, none of the 61 showed at this month's meeting.

**Ed Murtha** proposed two amendments to our bylaws. The first requires that annual HTPS Executive Board meetings be held in August & March. The other amendment stipulates that an annual budget be submitted for final review to the membership every September by the HTPS Treasurer. These amendments will be voted on by the membership at our next meeting.

There were several Show 'n Tell items. **Ron Gonzalez** displayed a catalog on Puerto Rico Stationary that he has created. **Jim Cope** received a first day cover in the mail only to find that the Trenton post office added a second cancellation to the stamp. **Andrew Boyajian** continues to expand his collection of Christmas postal items.

The evening's presentation was provided by **Jeff Boyarsky** who spoke on "Vintage Halloween Postcards" (see page 4 for a summary).

## JAPANESE OCCUPATION OF THE PHILIPPINES

[This article summarizes **Mac Sarreal's** talk at our September meeting. His complete presentation is on the [HTPS website](https://www.htps.com). Mac's talk included an overview of key events during the occupation including philatelic materials relating to that time.]

On December 7, 1941, ten hours after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, Manila was attacked. More bombings occurred the next day including Nichols Field outside of Manila. The Japanese landed at the northern part of Luzon on December 10.



More bombings and landings occurred throughout December. General Douglas MacArthur, head of the Allied Forces, withdrew from Manila, relocated to Bataan and eventually left the Philippines in March.

On January 2, 1942, the Japanese captured Manila. The Japanese Military Administration was established, postal service was suspended, then re-opened under Japanese control on March 4.

Existing stamps were invalidated and two values were issued – 2 centavos for ordinary mail and 16 centavos for registered. Black bars covered all references to U.S. postal administration use as shown on the cover below.



By May 1942, Japanese forces conquered Bataan, Corregidor and Mindanao. It took until September 1944 for American forces to start bombing Japanese held areas in the Philippines.

One month later, the battle of Leyte Gulf (Oct. 23-26, 1944) changed the course of fighting to regain the Philippines.



In January 1945, the U.S. Sixth Army landed at Lingayen Gulf marking the beginning of the liberation of Manila by American and Filipino soldiers. Over the next two months, U.S. forces free Manila and re-capture Bataan and Corregidor.



On Feb. 3, 1945, U.S. forces entered Manila resulting in the last day of postal service under Japanese occupation. The cover below marks the occasion with a "Feb 3" postmark, a slogan cancel and a purple victory cachet commemorating the event.



During the Japanese occupation, over 50 stamps were issued including regular issues, semi-postals and officials. Only one revenue postage stamp was issued (shown at the right).

Except for a few items, most occupation issues are relatively inexpensive and would make for a nice collection or exhibit.



## VINTAGE HALLOWEEN POSTCARDS

Halloween has its roots in an ancient Celtic festival called Samhain which celebrates the change of season from summer to winter.

That is the start of the Celtic New Year and is supposedly filled with magic.

Ghosts and demons were free to roam the earth, so villagers would wear ghastly costumes to fool the spirits and make food offerings to the dead.

Those pagan rites were adopted by the Catholic

Church and "All Hallows Eve" became "Hallowe'en." The Victorians thought of Hallowe'en as a genteel holiday about romance, parlor games and child's play. Their cards featured adorable chubby-cheeked children and black cats. Witches were often depicted as pretty ladies bringing messages of love as shown in the Winsch postcard at the right.



John O. Winsch produced beautiful and collectible Halloween postcards between 1911-1915 using heavy, rich inks and embossing. He sent them to Germany to be printed.

One of Winsch's artists, Samuel L. Schmucker, often portrayed beautiful women in scenes with bright colors and signing some of his artwork with a "SLS" monogram.



Ellen H. Clapsaddle produced some of the most unusual Halloween cards for Raphael Tuck and Sons, and other publishers. Her style is distinct, particularly her postcard illustrations of young children.

Jason Frexias produced holiday cards for Winsch showing cute round-faced toddlers with starfish hands. Because Frexias did not copyright his work, his images were often copied.

Many Halloween postcards feature themes of romance, superstitions or precautions on how to avoid danger during that day.



One popular romantic theme for Halloween shows a young woman looking into a mirror at the stroke of midnight to see the face of her true love by using the light of a jack o' lantern. Sometimes she looks into a hand mirror at a larger mirror over her shoulder. Notice the cat and witch outline in the background.



Some Halloween postcards can bring good news for the day. A popular one is a witch holding a colored lantern where the color indicates your future. The blue lantern and the inscription in this postcard state that your future is bright. Other colors are not as good for your well being.



Other Halloween postcard types exist, some with only one message – to wish you a Happy Halloween!

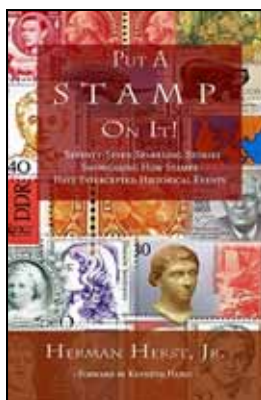
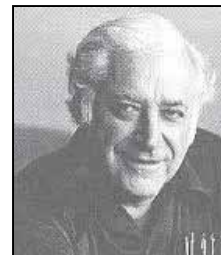

## HERMAN HERST BOOK

A new book, produced by Kenneth Herst and titled *Put a Stamp on It!*, offers 77 stories that, according to the subtitle, showcase “how stamps have intercepted historical events.” The book was developed from a manuscript written by Kenneth’s father – the legendary Herman “Pat” Herst, Jr. (pictured).



What do the Charlie Ross kidnapping, the Dunning sale, Britain’s female mason, Sherlock Holmes and the Littlewood’s pool, the founding of the YMCA, George Sloane, and the Madeline Smith Postcard all have in common? Stamps were an important part of these historical events.

The 364-page book is an interesting read in true Pat Herst style. It is available on Amazon.com for \$16.99 or \$3.99 for a Kindle edition.
